

## AGENDA

An in-depth study of the Ethiopian procurement system was carried out by the World Bank, covering the federal level and four regional states: Addis Ababa City Administration; Afar; Oromia; and Southern Nations, Nationalities, and People's region (SNNPR). Lower regional administration levels (selected zones and woredas) were also assessed.

While the twin emergencies (COVID-19 and the locust plague) that hit the country constituted an important challenge to the assessment, these provided an opportunity to also assess the ability of the procurement system to respond to critical emergency situations. This event will present the main findings and recommendations of the Ethiopia MAPS assessment, as well as the next steps that the country will undertake to improve its public procurement.
